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SEPTEMBER 1998 NEWSLETTER

Well another successful session of tree planting was finished off on August the 16th with Ed, Ranger Rob, Anne, Wendy, Lee, Danny, Nick, Dorothy, Chris and a new recruit Guang Lu (just came over from China.) The day started at the usual time of 10:30 and at about 11 O'clock it started to rain. It rained on and off all day making the whole experience a lot more "enjoyable". Late in the afternoon we came across two huge flowering weeds which we took upon ourselves to remove from the park and relocate to the safety of Ed's garden. Later on in the day we had a barbecue, but good old Dorothy managed to burn the snags. After lunch we went for a bit of a sight seeing at the weir and planted the last of the trees that we put along the banks of Billys creek. In all we planted 2800 plants in the last four mouths. In the last planting section we planted swamp gums, blue gums, manna gums, silver wattle and black woods.

A few things had to be bought (clippers and other assorted tools,) but most of the money was invested in high quality tree guards. REPORT ON PARKS FORUM IN MELBOURNE

There were only 100 year 11 students chosen in the State out of hundreds of entries. We were given the VIP treatment and most of the two days were taken up at Albert Park. It was quite amusing when a young greenie jumped up out of the crowd and asked embarassing questions to the head of Parks Victoria about why one of the head people on the board for Parks Victoria is also one of the head people running the Jabiluka mine at Kakadu in the Northen Territory .

Then just after that we were swamped by people protesting about old growth forests being cut down in East Gippsland near Orbost. And to cap it all off there where people handing out save Albert Park pamphlets. Quite exciting! On the final day we where asked many questions about what things should be changed with regard to Victorian National Parks. There was one very suss question they asked us, should Victorian Parks being privatised. There was much debate but in the end it was evident that 99% of people thought they shouldn't be privatised. I made it quite clear that if the parks were fully privertised many friends groups would feel used because they'ed be working for a private company and not be paid. This would lead to a lack of support for friends groups, and it is a well known fact that without the support of the friends groups many Parks would be lost.
