Tree Planting Finale

August's activity ended up turning into a comedy of errors. It started out normally enough with everyone meeting at the Braniff's Road carpark where we also met up with Scouts from 1st Churchill Scout Troop. They had come along to give us a hand with the last tree planting of the year. Everyone was keen to get going. The Scouts had split up into five groups and were to be supervised by the members of the Friends group. We all walked down the track with Rob following in the 4WD towing the trailer, until we came to the first small area to be planted. Rob explained to the Scouts what was going to happen and we all then set about the process of tree planting. The Scouts did a great job and I found after a while that the group I was working with had discovered which job they preferred and they began working like a real team. From the initial small planting area we then kept walking until we came to the base of Clematis track, where we found oodles of guards and stakes waiting for all the keen planters. On the higher parts of the slope the ground was a bit hard and proved to be a bit challenging for the Scouts when it came to digging the hole, but with help from the expert tree diggers from the Friends group, we finally managed to get everything done.

From the slopes we kept walking around to Potato Flat where we found more guards and stakes. By this time the Scouts knew what they were doing and most of them got stuck into the planting. But, there was a distraction. A sheep had been found in the river up against the embankment. It looked like it was stuck between the embankment and the roots that were hanging down. It was amusing to watch the Scout Leaders trying to come up with ways to coerce the sheep to move. They had quite a few onlookers (myself included) but they didn't manage to rescue the sheep. Rob was going to have to do that the next day.

After a quick drink and a bite to eat, I managed to get the Scouts back into the business of tree planting. Rob and Ken had taken off in the 4WD and I assumed they were about to get the BBQ organised for

our lunch. Unfortunately, when we rounded the next bend on our way to the weir, there before our weary eyes was another large patch of tree guards awaiting us. The chorus of groans that went up was just about unanimous! I decided that it was going to take too much effort to encourage the Scouts to regain enough enthusiasm to plant the trees carefully, although I have to admit that I had had enough as well! So after some discussion with the Scout Leaders and the Friends, it was decided that we would continue walking around to the weir and have our BBQ and come back and finish planting the trees once everyone had been fed and rested.

Good idea, bad timing. Unfortunately Rob wasn't expecting us for another half an hour, so consequently he hadn't had time to set up the BBQ. Luckily everyone had brought their lunch with them (except Rob), so we all got stuck into our sandwiches while Rob tried to get the BBQ going. And tried and TRIED. Unfortunately, the regulator had rusted out and neither Rob nor the Scout Leader was able to fix it. So...Rob decided that he would go into Morwell and buy a new one and while he was gone we would all go back and finish the tree planting with renewed energy. We would have the BBQ at the end of the tree planting session in the car park. Great idea!

So we headed back with the Scouts while Rob and Ken packed up the ute and BBQ. Ken and Dorothy hitched a ride and stayed in the carpark with the trailer while Rob went into Bunnings. We finished the last patch of planting quite quickly, counted heads and tools, and then started back to the carpark. Along the walk back, some of us took the high road and some of us took the low road. Jane and I had gumboots on, so we coped with the river crossings quite well, but the Scouts were in sneakers and had to find an alternate river crossing. Which they did while we watched on. I'm sure they enjoyed the challenge of not getting their feet wet!

Once back at the carpark we stood around waiting for Rob to come back. Eventually, (or maybe unfortunately!) I belatedly noticed that one of our members was missing. Had anybody seen John? Nope! Dorothy had been the last one to see him. He had been walking out from the weir but we hadn't seen him pass us while we were tree planting. It was eventually decided that a search party had better go looking for him. Ken drove his vehicle down the track as far as he could and then he walked with Danny back to the weir. Mike and Denis followed along, looking in all the nooks and crannies and alternative tracks.

When Rob finally got back, hungry and annoyed that the day was being dragged out, we then had to tell him that John was missing. It didn't improve his mood! After leaving the valve with us to attach to the BBQ, he also set off in the 4WD to find John. We had started enjoying the BBQ when someone noticed John walking along the road back to the carpark. He had walked all the way out to Junction Road carpark and then walked all the way back to the Braniff's Road carpark – but hadn't told anyone his intentions! Thankful that he was OK, but annoyed at the time lost, Wendy and I set off to find the men. We got lucky and found Rob heading back along the track from Junction Road. President's Report 2001-2002**

Having been re-elected your President last year, after a break of 5 years, it falls to me to report on another full year of development of Morwell National Park.

Among important achievements at which we have all worked very hard, have been the thorough elimination (for the moment) of all willows from along the accessible section of Billys Creek. There will be a lot of follow up work needed in the years to come, but the willows are now pretty well gone and the replacement plantings are beginning to fill the gaps.

Tree planting has been an ongoing task for many years. We have been planting since 1989, with the big task of revegetating the Billys Creek flats being started in the pouring rain on 6th May 1991. Well we have finally finished that enormous task. We have planted between 1500 and 2000 trees each year over that period which adds up to over 20,000 trees, together with major contributions from other groups, especially the Trust for Conservation Volunteers who planted a large number of trees in the early 1990's.

Revegetation isn't over though and we have already made a small start to the next major task, the revegetation of Blue Gum Hill all over its very steep hillsides. We are running trials to determine how best to achieve this and our current efforts are being devoted to clayballs as a means of growing trees and shrubs from seed.

Last November saw us all making mud pies all afternoon, or rather rolling 3600 little balls of clay and seeds. In April, we spread the first of these over a 10m by 10m, fenced area and we are eagerly awaiting the evidence this spring of whether we have started some trees growing on the hillside!

While on the hill, Rob inspected our earlier seeding trial which was pretty successful and still has some 86 wattles and gum trees surviving and growing well, out of the 123 that were first established.

Seed collection is now targeted at the species we want to grow on Blue Gum Hill, particularly blue gum and varnish wattle and a lot of effort was put into collecting the seed. It was a bad year for silver wattle and blackwood seed in the park, but we have good reserves of both species.

Other improvements in the Park during the year include:

- Improvements to the Fosters Gully Track resulting from repairs to the area damaged by the fire the previous year.
- Completion of the installation of benches at strategic points along all the tracks and installation of signposts at key points to show the various tracks in the Billys Creek area.
- Provision of a Billys Creek track leaflet available in boxes at the entrances to the Park.
- Distribution of the Park Brochures developed by the Friends and in particular the result of great work by Ed Steenbergen.

The annual koala count was again well attended and we were again assisted by the Central Gippsland Older Adults Recreational Network. 10 koalas were found and a lot of orchids were also seen including one of the least common species in the park, the short-lipped leek orchid, *Prasophyllum brevilabre*.

Parks Victoria again rewarded us for our labours by providing a spit roast in December, which was well received by the Friends and visitors from Friends of Baw Baw, Tarra Bulga and Mt. Worth.

The Park has had many visitors over the year. I guided groups from the Traralgon Historical society and from the Region's Cub Scouts around the Park and Mike did the same with a group from the Australian Plant Society.

On March 23rd I represented the Friends at the Friends Network seminar. This was on the subject of native grasslands and was held at the Organ Pipes National Park. The March weekend next year will see the next biennial Friends Network Conference.

We have continued success in obtaining grants for our ongoing work in the Park. This year we have obtained a grant to install a gas barbecue and improved notice board shelter in the Kerry Road picnic area.

We have also obtained funding and assistance for the removal of the pines alongside Jumbuck Road and to replace them with the appropriate native species. It will be nice to be able to remove pines and willows from the plant list for the Park!

The implementation of the Regional Forest Agreement and the termination of the lease on the block behind Blue Gum Hill are still in the process of consultation, but it seems clear that this land will become part of the Park before long and we shall then be able to proceed with developing the Coprosma track.

I continue to maintain the Morwell National Park website and have recently added the Park Newsletter to the site, with an archive of old newsletters back to 1996. It is also now possible to obtain distribution maps for all the plant and animal species I have recorded in the Park.

Finally I must say a round of thank yous. First thank you is to Ed Steenbergen for his great work as president for the last few years. Then I must thank all my fellow committee members for their help in keeping the Friends at work, especially Jane as secretary, Wendy as treasurer and Mike for his great work at producing the newsletter each month. My final thank you is to our ranger Rob Howell, who as always has worked so well to maintain and improve the Park and has worked with and supported the Friends in all our activities.

Ranger's Report - Morwell NP 2001/2002

Another eventful year has passed in the Park and an important milestone has at last been reached: The completion of tree planting on the flats along Billy Creek. Thanks to everyone who has contributed to this monumental task over the last 12 years. It gives one a great sense of satisfaction to look out over that valley now and see thousands of native trees on what were once bare paddocks with a creek hidden by Willows.

Large amounts of blackberry spraying were again done by contractors in the Billy Creek area, using Good Neighbour funding. The big patches along Clematis Track were treated and follow up work was done on areas along Lodge Track, Side Creek, Zig Zag Track and above Billys Creek.

The Grant application for 2002/2003 has been successful so we should have our new gas BBQ installed by late spring / early summer and a new notice board for Friends' stuff in the info shelter sometime after that. The 2001/2002 Grant of \$3100 to construct a fence around the Blue Gum Hill revegetation area turned out to be less than half what was needed to do the job (the best quote obtained was \$7550), so the money was spent on tree planting materials and more fencing materials. We now have enough wire, posts etc to build 1 km of fence around the reveg site.

All the seats, signs and leaflet boxes for Billys Creek walking tracks have been put in place and walking track notes are now available at Junction Road and Braniffs Road. Also, a new picnic table was installed in Lyndon's Clearing with the funding which came to the Friends group through Ellen's will.

Our experiment with making clay seed balls by hand has shown this technique to be very labour intensive and, if the field trials show a good germination and survival rate, it may be worthwhile building a machine to make them.

Once again, thanks to all Friends for making the last twelve months a very fruitful and productive year for Morwell National Park. Give yourselves a big pat on the back. In future we should try to fit more fun-type activities into the calendar.
