Foster's Gully storm damage

In June, a large storm hit Morwell National Park and surrounding areas. The park is still closed, but many people are still walking in both sections of the park.

Soon after the storm much track clearing was done, but there is no evidence of further work being done over the last month with more trees coming down across tracks. It has been reported that there is at least one large tree across the track on the Grand Strzelecki Track.

In mid-August more rain again swelled Billy's Creek (as shown below). It increased the water in the creek but cause no flooding.

Steps to Stringybark Track



Trees down across the steps to Stringybark Track after the original storm.

The main tree has been removed and the track is still blocked by fallen trees.

Foster's Gully



Branches have fallen across Foster's Gully track.



Some further trees have fallen across the track as well.



Multiple trees have fallen across the track near Lyndon's Clearing.

A number of large trees have been cleared from the track.

Blue Gum Hill track



The first creek crossing to Blue Gum Hill. It is now a deep ravine requiring a lot of earth and rock movement or a bridge if walkers are to cross safely.



At the second creek crossing walkers can walk across although many stones have washed up here.



A Silver Wattle has fallen across the track. Blackberries on the bank have been sprayed and are mostly dead.



The flooded creek has underwashed the track leaving little of the original track. Blackberries and other plants will need to cut back on the bank to allow safe walking.



A few markers have been put along the track, hopefully indicating plans for work from Parks.



The footing to the bridge (near Billy's Weir) remain on both banks. If the bridge is to replaced these footings could be reused.
